How important is personal protection equipment?

It is ESSENTIAL! Just ask our team of 23 providers (doctors, physician assistants and nurse practitioners) who have been giving COVID-based care 24/7 since April at McLaren Bay Region. They are thankful for all the community donations towards personal protection equipment (PPE).

Dr. Elizabeth Pionk, who leads McLaren Bay Region's Hospitalist group, says "we take safety and hygiene very seriously. The team is very meticulous about hand washing, sanitizing and safety. We value PPE and it feels good to know that the hospital and community values it, as well."

Dr. Pionk goes further to explain that ready access to daily masks and N95s gives her team the mental reassurance and confidence that they will be able to continue to provide care.

How much PPE do we use?

For patients with COVID, (plus those with symptoms and being tested for COVID), a new gown and gloves are worn every time someone enters their room. Besides the nurses that routinely checks on the patient hourly, other people gowning up and entering includes doctors, PAs, NPs, therapists, as well as environmental workers that clean each room daily with special disinfectants. Since April, McLaren Bay Region have used:

- 50,000 face masks
- 10,000 N95 respirator masks
- 172,000 isolation gowns

In addition, disposable stethoscopes are kept in each room to prevent possible spread of the virus from room to room. Other PPE includes hair coverings, eye shields, sanitizer wipes and gallons of hand sanitizer.

Yes, it is safe to come to the hospital!

"As the pandemic continues, we will be here to take care of COVID patients, however, it is vital to take care of our non-COVID patients, as well. Because of all these safety precautions, we are able to deliver excellent healthcare in a very safe environment," explains Dr. Pionk.

We urge all people experiencing urgent health concerns to come to the hospital emergency room. If you are suffering with a chronic condition, you need to follow through with your primary doctor. We are seeing many chronic conditions go too far because patients defer going to the hospital.

"Please don't wait," urges Dr. Pionk. "Emergent and chronic conditions need to be seen. The safety and hygiene measures McLaren Bay Region has implemented enables all patients to be evaluated and treated safely."

- Ultraviolet disinfectant units

The ultraviolet disinfection unit is a safe, highpowered, simple and effective tool that is now part of our infection control program. The unit was essential when there was a shortage of N95 respirator masks. The sterile processing staff was able to disinfect masks daily. The UV equipment can also be used to sanitize operating rooms and any other room where harmful bacteria and viruses may exist.

HEARTSTRINGS CAMPAIGN... SAVING LIVES THROUGH TELEMETRY



The Need

Did you know cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women in America causing one in every four deaths? However, in Bay County, the statistics are even worse – one out of every three deaths are due to heart disease.

Cardiac Telemetry

"Heartstrings" is a very simplistic description of a telemetry system that can ensure a patient's heartbeat and other vital signs are monitored 24/7 without a nurse having to be at their bedside the entire time. Cardiac telemetry is modern, state-of-the-art science, that results in high quality, efficient and effective care.

Patients dealing with everything from stroke or vascular complications, to kidney failure or cancer... all benefit from telemetry monitoring.

Telemetry monitoring is especially important in the emergency room. People who come with chest pains, high blood pressure or a history of heart attacks all need immediate monitoring to help determine a diagnosis and/or prevent a cardiac event.

Goal and Project Plan

Our goal is to expand our cardiac telemetry to monitor even more patients. This technology is expensive. McLaren Bay Region has a centralized system of telemetry with two certified telemetry technicians and 112 monitors. The expansion and upgrade will add 32 telemetry units, which will allow 144 patients access to the vital heartstrings. All the monitors will be upgraded to high definition flatscreens.

The Result

The benefits of an updated, expanded and state-of-the-art telemetry system include:

- Increased patient safety
- Quicker diagnosis and/or treatment
- Ability to give high quality, efficient and effective care

HOW CARDIAC TELEMETRY WORKS

The patient wears electrodes on the chest which are attached to leads and a telemetry transmitter. The transmitter sends the electrical activity of the heart to a computer screen, where the patient's heart rate and rhythm can be monitored continuously and unobtrusively by telemetry technicians.

Wearing a portable transmitter allows patients to be mobile, which means they can be moved throughout the hospital as needed.

If the patient develops problems, staff are immediately notified and respond quickly. Abnormalities and arrhythmias can also be noted and brought to the attention of a cardiologist who can use this information in diagnosis and treatment. The sooner treatment is offered, the better the prognosis for the patient.


